## AFGHANISTAN & NORTH WEST FRONTIER. 1878-1880.

SUBADAR KISHUBIR NUGGURKOTI, Ist Bn:, 5th Gurkhas, has the honor of being the only soldier in the whole of the Indian Army who earned, by repeated acts of gallantry, the 3rd, 2nd and 1st Classes of the Order of Merit and a special gold Bar, in addition, to be worn with the 1st Class Star.

This grand soldier gained all three stars of the Order, during the Afghan War of 1878-1880. He was admitted to the 3rd Class of the Order in the rank of sepoy for having on the 13th December 1878, when the rear guard was attacked by the enemy in the Mangiar Pass, gallantry charged back the Afghans and recovered the dead and wounded He received the 2nd Class Star for gallantry at Charasia on the 6th October 1879. At the battle of Charasia a party of the 5th Gurkhas with a detachment of the 72nd Highlanders were assaulting a hill held by the enemy. C. Chenevix Trench was in want of reinforcements, and Kishnbir Nuggurkoti was the first man who volunteered to fetch reinforcements from the rear. performing this service, he was exposed to a heavy fire from the enemy, but he went back and returned with reinforcements, and his gallaut example was soon followed by others of the same regiment.

Kishubir was promoted to the 1st Class as Naik for his gallantry at Kabul on the 12th December 1879. On this occasion he went to the assistance of Lieut. Fasken, 3rd Sikhs, who was wounded in both legs and lay on the knoll below the conical hill, under a smart fire from the enemy. Lieut. Fasken was at the time trying to crawl away when Kishubir, with Havildar Kurin Sing Negi and Sepoy Dummer Sing, went to his assistance and remained with him under fire until they were able to eventually remove him under cover.

The fourth act of gallantry and devotion performed by this grand soldier was on the 18th June 1888 on the Black Mountain, Agrore, when he defended the persons of Major Legh Richmond Battye, 5th Gurkhas, and Captain Henry Brabazon Urmston, 6th Punjab Infantry, both of whom lost their lives. The noble devotion exhibited by the Subadar on the occasion in question is unparalleled in the history of the Indian Army. On the evening of the 17th June 1888, Kishubir received orders from Major Battye to parade all available men of the detachment early the next morning as he intended going up into the hills to examine the water supply. Accordingly, the Indian Officer with 2 Havildars, 3 Naiks, 2 Buglers and 53 Sepoys paraded and marched under the orders of Major Battye who was accompanied by Captain Urmston; the latter totally unarmed. A first halt was made near Barcha, for a drink, and a second halt, for breakfast, near a spring on the top of a hill. After breakfast, Major Battye and Capt. Urmston proceeded with an advance guard of the nine men and left the Subadar with the temaining men behind. But they had not proceeded very far when Major Battye made a signal to the Subadar to come on, and, while moving up with his men,

the Indian officer heard some shots fired in front, but his men were not molested at first and he saw no signs of an enemy. Suddenly two shots were fired in the rear wounding the Havildar of the rear guard. This was at once reported to Major Battye, and the Subadar ordered his men to open their ammunition, and had the wounded man put into a dandy. Major Battye, Capt. Urmston and the Hospital assistant then came up, and, after the Havildar was attended to, Major Battye ordered a Section in Skirmishing order to be thrown out to cover the rear and to take up a position further back with the remainder of the men. This was done and Major Battve having ordered in the section covering the rear, three volleys were fired at the enemy who had collected in great numbers on three sides of the party, only leaving the slope towards Thakot clear. The right section was then ordered to retire and Capt. Urmston who was with this section, was severely wounded on the left shoulder by a blow from an axe delivered by a man who had come up unseen. Captain Urmston snatched a rifle from a sepoy, fired a round, returned the rifles to the sepoy and then doubled and joined the left section where Major Battve and the Subadar were. The right section then retired and on the way found the wounded Havildar in the dandy on the road. Major Battye ordered the Kahars to take up the dandy on the road, but whilst giving this order a man rushed out and cut Major Battye over the left shoulder with a tulwar. Major Battye turned and was defending himself with his sword when Kishubir ran up and drove his sword through the man with both his hands. In the meanwhile the wounded man in the daudy had been deserted by the Kahars and the Subadar directed two sepoys to kneel down and cover
